
DRUG POISONING Information AWARENESS DAY 2024 & Resources

Drug Poisoning Awareness Day is an annual event held in alignment with International Overdose Awareness Day. It aims to raise awareness to end accidental drug poisonings, remember community members we have lost without stigma, and advocate for health-focused policies for people who use substances.

Many people in our community have been touched by drug poisonings. The following information is shared with the intent to offer knowledge about the drug toxicity crisis and actions that can be taken to address it.

Thousands of people in our community are impacted by the drug poisoning crisis.


- Since 2016, more than **40,400** lives have been lost from opioid-related deaths in Canada.
- On average, **10 people a day** die from accidental drug poisoning deaths in Ontario.

• In 2023, there were at least **62 deaths** from drug poisoning in Guelph & Wellington County.

The unregulated drug supply is toxic and unpredictable because there are no quality control measures in place. Testing done at drug-checking sites tells us that there are many high strength and unpredictable substances currently in circulation. The Toronto Drug Checking Service have been gathering the following data since 2019:

Here are some ways to get involved:

- Engage with your MP, MPP, Mayor and City Councilors to let them know that we need to see changes in the way our society treats people who experience challenges with substances, including health-focused policies and services. Share your ideas and give your vote to the candidates who represent the change you want to see.
- The Pathways to Remembering Memorial is being built to show respect and compassion for community members whose lives have been lost to drug poisoning.
