Consumption and Treatment Services (CTS) Closure Facts: CTS to Hart Hub

On March 31, 2025, **Consumption and** Treatment Services (CTS) at Guelph CHC will close.

We will transition to a HART Hub, which will not replace CTS services.



Here is some information about these changes, and what you can do to prepare.

We are still in a drug toxicity crisis.

The unregulated drug supply is unpredictable and toxic. People who use substances are at risk of drug poisoning. When the CTS closes, there will likely be an increase in public substance use and people in our community having adverse reactions.

What this means for our community


Individuals and businesses, especially downtown, might see more...

- public substance use
- overdoses/ drug poisonings
- sharps and drug use equipment in public spaces

Guelph's CTS is an anonymous walk-in service offered 7 days/week for community members who use substances.

Guelph Wellington Homelessness and Addiction Recovery Treatment (HART) Hub is a healthcare facility that will provide treatment, housing, and support for people with complex needs.
